Our LEAD (Leadership through Exploration, Action, and Discovery) Programs help teens develop life skills while exploring hands-on activities alongside peers and caring adults. LEAD serves teens from Aspen to Glenwood Springs, and Rifle in a group setting where they achieve personal growth while supporting their peers to do the same. We prioritize serving youth who could benefit from extra support in their homes, communities, or school environments.

During the 2023-2024 school year, the LEAD Program served 171 unduplicated students in grades 6-12 with a combined total of **19,022** contact hours!

### These students participated in a wide variety of programmatic offerings:

- Outdoor Leadership served a total of 122 students:
- Aspen Middle School, in its sixth year, enrolled 17 participants
- Basalt Middle School, in its eighth year, had 12 participants
- Basalt High School, in its ninth school year, enrolled 8 students
- Carbondale Middle School, in its eleventh year, had 14 participants
- Glenwood Springs Middle School, in its second year, had 14 participants
- Glenwood Springs High School, is in its first year, had 12 participants
- Riverview School, is in its first year, had 10 participants
- Rifle High School, in its sixth year, had 13 students
- Rifle Middle School, in its sixth year, had 12 participants
- Roaring Fork High School, in its eleventh school-year, enrolled 10 students
- Hosted 57 participants for monthly activities including a Youth Camp reunion, an evening of bowling, a Winter Celebration, ice skating, hiking, and swimming.
- Our annual Youth Camp in Moab, Utah, in June served 29 campers entering grades 9-12
- Our annual Dream Day Camp served 28 campers entering grades 6-8 in the Roaring Fork Valley in July
- 50 youth participated in more than one LEAD program





### LEAD serves youth through four components





### **Outdoor Leadership**

Offered for the last 11 years, Outdoor Leadership is our signature LEAD program. It consists of a high school class designed, taught, and funded by the Buddy Program. In 2023-2024 we offered programing at four high schools-Basalt, Roaring Fork, Glenwood Springs, and Rifle, and six middle schools - Basalt, Carbondale, Aspen Riverview in, Glenwood Springs, Riverview and Rifle.



#### Youth Camp

Coordinated by the Buddy Program since 2010, Youth Camp gives teens the chance to spend 5 days camping in the wilderness of Moab, UT. They challenge their physical limits through hiking, canyoneering, rafting, rock climbing, and other adventurous activities. In the evenings around the campfire, they focus on emotional growth, sharing stories, dreams, and struggles while building lasting peer connections.



#### Dream Day Camp

Dream Day Camp, also in existence since 2010, provides middle school youth the opportunity to experience hands-on and team building activities for 5 days in late summer, including an overnight camp-out. Activities include arts, outdoor, and service adventures, and help prepare students to enroll in Youth Camp in high school.



#### **Monthly Activities**

Throughout the year, monthly activities and informal check-ins with our LEAD program staff enable students in grades 6 - 12 to stay in touch with their peers and continue to expand their horizons. Activities include art workshops, camp reunions, snowshoeing, hiking, and other fun and educational pursuits.

### **Outdoor Leadership**

Outdoor Leadership, in its eleventh year of operation, served a total of 122 students at 10 schools. Our Outdoor Leadership curriculum is planned and taught by Buddy Program staff members.

Students develop skills for successful travel and exploration in the outdoors and give back to and connect with their community through service projects. They develop teamwork, communication, decision-making, leadership, and planning skills applied in and out of the classroom. At the high schools, where students earn high school Physical Education credit and Colorado Mountain College Outdoor Education credit for class participation, topics include Leave No Trace, Wilderness First Aid, trip planning, public lands management, map and compass use, group dynamics, and community service project development and execution.



### Some highlights from Outdoor Leadership in 2023-2024:

### At the High School level:

• We continued offering Outdoor Leadership at Basalt, Roaring Fork, and Rifle High Schools. We launched Outdoor Leadership at Glenwood Springs High School for the first time!

- Students enrolled in year-long classes participated in 300 hours of classroom learning and backcountry trips, including backpacking, trips to Fruita, Moab, and Dominguez Escalante, rafting, canyoneering, rock climbing, snowshoeing, hiking, and service projects.
- 38 high schoolers earned Colorado Mountain College credits for the courses of Non-Technical Mountaineering and Mountain Orientation.

### At the Middle School level:

- We continued offering Outdoor Leadership at Aspen, Basalt, Carbondale, Glenwood Springs, and Rifle Middle Schools. We launched Outdoor Leadership at Riverview School for the first time!
- Participants took 3-day trips to the Colorado National Monument, Dinosaur National Monument, Moab, Sylvan Lake State Park, and Shrine Mountain Inn (backcountry hut).

## Youth Camp

Youth Camp is perhaps the program our high school-aged youth anticipate the most each year. For 5 days each June, a staff of Buddy Program camp counselors and climbing guides head to the La Sal Mountains outside of Moab, Utah, with students entering grades 9-12. Our camp family spends their days rock climbing, canyoneering and rappelling, rafting the Colorado River, hiking, building a respectful camp community, and creating strong bonds and memories.

### For our campers, Youth Camp is:

- A chance to make new friends and build peer networks from Aspen to Carbondale
- A healthy and constructive break from the pressures of everyday teen life at home and a place where they can be themselves

- A safe place to expand their individual comfort zones and try new things, taking the lessons learned with them to apply at home and school
- A time to set goals and work on achieving them
- An opportunity for our Peer Counselors (returning campers who help foster a strong camp community and give back) to gain leadership skills
- An environment where youth are surrounded by encouraging peers and positive adult role models



29 Buddy Program youth from Aspen to Rifle participated in our annual Moab Youth Camp for 5 days and 4 nights.

Challenges were met, fears were faced, friendships were formed, and memories were made!

### **Dream Day Camp**

Dream Day Camp takes place annually in the Roaring Fork Valley in August, serving youth entering grades 6 – 8. This camp is one of the entry points into LEAD for new, young participants, and graduates frequently go on to Youth Camp upon completion.

### At Dream Day Camp campers:

- Make new friends their age and build peer networks from Aspen to Carbondale
- Explore the amazing natural resources of the Roaring Fork Valley through activities such as art projects, rafting, service projects, hiking, and camping
- Build life skills such as communication, teamwork, positive attitude, participation, and trust
- Participate in a respectful camp community for a week during late July – a great way to re-engage in a structured environment prior to school starting, and a break from summer when many participants lack activities to keep themselves constructively busy

### In 2024...

Youth experienced everything from arts and crafts with Carbondale Arts, to outdoor adventures with Elk Mountain Expeditions, the ropes course at Colorado Mountain College, fishing with the Roaring Fork Conservancy, and swimming at the Basalt pool. Additionally, the group had the opportunity to engage in meaningful community service with Roaring Fork Volunteers.
